FIRST COMMUNION 1960

Fifty years ago I received my first Communion at Sacred Heart of Jesus Church. The date was the May 15th, the day following the wedding of my Aunt Evelyn and Uncle Stan. I don't remember how many classmates were with me—I'd have to locate my First communion Class picture—but there were about 30 of us at least, all kids from the neighborhood. The girls all wore their fancy white dresses and veils while the boys all sported their traditional blue suits. We all had new prayer books, rosaries, candles and scapulars—all the accourtements suitable for the new communicant.

The Franciscan Sisters of Blessed Cunegunda had prepared us for this event. We were required to know our prayers, the necessary details from the Baltimore Catechism, the format for going to Confession, how to fold our hands etc... Being in second grade it was not as though we had an awful lot of baggage to bring

along with us, but to each of us on that day, it was as if nothing else could have been more important in the universe. Believing that God made us, that He made us to know love and serve Him, that Jesus was in even the smallest piece of the consecrated host—these were the beliefs instilled into our young hearts and minds by Sr. M. Benilda and Sr. M. Pacomia in fist and second grade.

The innocence of those early years would change over the years as life progressed. We would still be Catholics (perhaps) or Christians (perhaps) or possibly neither of the above. Life beyond second grade was one thing, but life beyond grade school, then high school, then college etc... would be another thing. The free will which we were all granted by the Creator allowed us to decide our paths in life. It allowed us to disregard all that had been taught us in our innocence. It allowed us to choose alternate roads and to avoid others. It would even allow us to deny good and prefer evil, to choose the culture of death over the culture of life.

This weekend we heard Pope Benedict, during his pilgrimage to Portugal, state quite clearly that we are all to blame for the problems of the Church because we have sinned and we continue to sin. While the high profile cases are those which tend to capture most people's attention when this is mentioned (e.g. pedophilia) we must examine our consciences more deeply and scrutinize our own daily actions to see how even our own sins contribute to the cancer which regularly attacks the flock of Christ. Our pettiness, our jealousy, our gossip, our small mindedness, bickering, back-biting, envy, lack of self-control, idleness, indifference and outright befriending of evil....all contribute to the assault on the Church, not just the 'BIG' sex sins which garner attention by the sensational press.

Can we ever regain the innocence of the time of our first Holy Communion? There are many who regularly make that their goal, who seek God's assistance and help to accomplish that very thing. The gifts given to us at our Confirmation can help us, but only if we open the seven packages granted to us on that occasion and read the instructions as to how those gifts should be used. The detailed directions lead us to goodness, to be worthy of continually receiving Jesus in the Holy Eucharist. On the occasion of our First Holy Communion the most important gift we received was Jesus. Hopefully that gift can never be broken or sold or taken away, but it can get dusty and lost in the attic—if we allow it to happen.

Pastoral Messages



Gentle and Reassuring

When I was a young priest not too long ago, I had the zeal, the ambition, the ability—at least, that's what I thought—to present to the Faithful in church a relatively "good homily". Being somewhat self-deceptive, I convinced myself that I was doing fine. And so, at

one of the parishes to which I assigned for weekends, I approached the Monsignor, the pastor of the parish and asked him: "Monsignor, do you think that I should put "more fire" into my sermons?" "No," he replied with a smile. You should put more of your sermons into the fire." He was right—homilies are meant to proclaim the truth in a spirit of compassion and sincerity and enliven faith and hope in parishioners.

Today, we celebrate the Feast of the Ascension. We all recall how Jesus proclaimed the message with kindness and love. All who heard him and believed in him were overwhelmed with peace and assurance that all would turn out fine. Their faith was either restored and/or strengthened.

The Faithful are to be reassured that the message of Jesus is always the main theme of a homily. Times may be changing, people great and less-known enter into eternity, culture changes we ourselves change—but the prayer and promise of Christ that gives us hope is: "Behold, I am with you till the end of the world." This prayer and promise not only expresses the trust that Jesus has for His Father, but also his trust in his disciples.

The Bible, the Word of God, is never a closed book of past events; a concluded historical account of the God's loving presence among people.

When Jesus returned to His Father, the situation among the Apostles changed radically. Sure, they entertained doubts, times of fear, potential opposition and persecution from others. Our Church today continues to change—through its strengths and weaknesses. You and I, to whom is the given the grace and mandate to proclaim "the homily of our lives" to others, must always look at the Scriptures as a book that is open toward the future. Looking back to Good Friday and staying there is hardly an incentive for others to be motivated and captivated by the life of Jesus. The Bible is a book about God's promises. If God fulfilled his most important promise—that of sending His Only Son into the world to redeem us—then we should never worry that God will deny us any other promises.

So, dear sister and brother, where does that leave you and me today? What kind of message do I proclaim to others? Are people convinced that my Catholic Faith is my guiding light in life? Do I invite others to healing and curing of their hurts as well as serve as an example of goodness and kindness to others, especially, the lesser fortunate?

Is the Church stronger because of me, or weaker? Am I willing to forgive everyone and move forward with my spiritual life? What can I do to make the Church a brighter beacon? What can I do to become "the light of world" and "the salt of earth?" It takes strong faith to heal others. Preaching "fire and brimstone" won't do it. But, proclaiming our lives by word and example, based on the life of Christ, will be very fruitful. Jesus is always near to us. Do we strive to be near to Him?

Duch Święty i Kościół

Przeżywamy Okres Wielkanocny. W tym czasie, zarówno w niedziele jak i w dni powszednie, słuchamy czytań wziętych z Dziejów Apostolskich. Bardzo słusznie, bo te czytania mówią o losach pierwotnego Kościoła, czyli wspólnoty wierzących w Chrystusa po Jego zmartwychwstaniu. 15 rozdział tej Księgi mówi o wydarzeniu



przełomowym, które zadecydowało o kształcie Kościoła, jakim znamy go dzisiaj. Tradycyjnie nazywamy to wydarzenie "Soborem Jerozolimskim". Odbył się w latach 49-50.

Niektórzy z nawróconych na chrześcijaństwo Żydów uważali, że przyjmujący wiarę w Pana Jezusa i chrzest powinni najpierw przyjąć obrzezanie, zachowywać obrzędowe przepisy Starego Testamentu jako warunek konieczny do zbawienia. Sobór nazwał to herezją. Wchodzący do Kościoła poganie nie musieli przyjmować obrzezania. Już wtedy - u początków Kościoła widzimy jego cechy, które widzimy także dzisiaj. Jest to Wspólnota obejmująca nie tylko jeden naród, lud wybrany Starego Testamentu - ale wierzących w Jezusa Chrystusa jako Boga i Zbawiciela wywodzących się zarówno z Żydów, jak i spoza tego narodu.

Dzieje Apostolskie ukazują nam głębokie znaczenie tego, czym jest Kościół - pokazując na cztery jego cechy, które wyznajemy w każdą niedzielę w czasie wyznania wiary. Kościół jest JEDEN, jak to możemy widzieć w pierwszym czytaniu: "Apostołowie" (biskupi) i prezbiterzy (czasem zwani "starszymi" - czyli kapłani) byli w jedności z "całym Kościołem" (świeccy).

Kościół jest ŚWIĘTY, nauczany, kierowany i uświęcany przez Ducha Świętego obiecanego przez Pana Jezusa w dzisiejszej Ewangelii. Kościół jest KATOLICKI, czyli inaczej mówiąc, uniwersalny, składający się z przedstawicieli wielu, jeśli nie wszystkich narodów na ziemi.

W końcu, Kościół jest APOSTOLSKI, to znaczy zbudowany na fundamencie dwunastu Apostołów Baranka. Wszystkie te cztery cechy wyróżniające Kościół są podkreślone w opisie soboru.

Warto zauważyć, że wszyscy, włączając w to św. Pawła, patrzą w stronę Jerozolimy i Dwunastu Apostołów, jeśli chodzi o znalezienie odpowiedzi na pytanie, co jest prawdziwą nauką Kościoła. Podobnie Dwunastu widzi potrzebę dania odpowiedzi wspólnocie szukającej wyjaśnienia bardzo żywotnej wtedy kwestii: Czy obrzezanie jest konieczne do zbawienia? Odpowiedź jest jednoznaczna: Nie należy wymagać poddania się obrzezaniu od tych, którzy przyjmują wiarę w Chrystusa. Apostołowie są pewni swego autorytetu. Pod decyzją w tej sprawie podpisują się: "Postanowiliśmy Duch Święty i my..."

Znając prawdę o Kościele katolickim nie powinniśmy nigdy pozwolić, aby nasze serce przeżywały jakikolwiek niepokój odnośnie nauki Kościoła. To Duch Święty go prowadzi i strzeże od pomyłki. Dlatego nasze serca powinny napełnić się ufnością: Słuchając Kościoła nie zbłądzimy; będąc posłuszni głosowi Kościoła, jesteśmy posłuszni Duchowi Świętemu.

Until we have all the facts, it's best to keep our hearts and minds open and not jump to conclusions. But how can we clear up misunderstandings or handle a legitimate complaint where a priest is concerned? your priest the courtesy of speaking with him privately, by phone, email, or in person by appointment, not in the vestibule after Mass. Let prayer guide your thoughts so that you may be honest with him but also respectful. Often a frank conversation goes a long way toward clearing the air and bringing resolution.



ST. STANS HISTORICAL FACT by Rob Jagelewski

The architect of our church building was William H. Dunn. Construction of the present church building began in 1886 and it was completed in 1891. Dunn also designed other religious buildings in the Diocese of Cleveland such as the Convent of the Good Shepherd, St. Wendelin Church (Columbus Road), and St. Mary's in Lorain. Dunn was the City of Cleveland building inspector under Mayor Brenton Babcock (1887-88) and Mayor George W. Gardner (1885, 86, 89, 91). He was the superintendent of public school buildings from 1884-1894. Dunn owned one sixth of the Fulton Tool Company.
