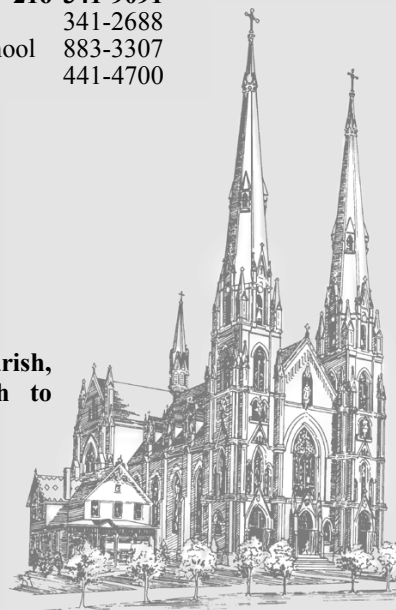

TOUGH LOVE

In today's Gospel we hear a little side of Jesus who some people might think got out of the wrong side of the bed. Crabby Jesus? Well, maybe—or maybe Jesus who is tired of people being lukewarm about their commitments. Maybe He's just tired of people who say one thing and do another. Maybe He is just tired of people who go around saying they are His followers one minute and yet act like a bunch of atheists or agnostics in the very next breath.

What do you think Jesus would say if spent a day in your house? Do you think He'd like what you read whether it is the PD or the National Enquirer, the National Catholic Reporter or the Wanderer while your family bible is hidden in some box so as to keep it from getting dirty? Do you think He'd like seeing your refrigerator and pantry loaded with food when He knows your neighbor is eating government cheese? Do you think He'd like listening in on your phone conversations or seeing what you waste time with on the internet? Do you think He'd like what you watch on TV, the trash which pollutes the world more quickly and surreptitiously than a leaking oil pipeline? Do you think He'd enjoy a day at your place?

So often we hear people comment as to how they get tired religious people taking things a little too seriously, like as if Jesus really meant what He said. So often we hear people justify their positions by blaming the leaders for indiscretions while their own lives resemble a scene from 'America's Most Wanted' or "TV Bloopers." Abortion? Well, you know our developed society does need to consider the world's overpopulation! Infidelity? Well, you know that there are another 20 bachelors or bachelorettes right around the corner just waiting to snatch up the discarded "treasure." Greed? What's it to the Church if I want to hoard money and things for which I have worked so hard.

It doesn't take a scientist to know the responses to most of the points I've mentioned. You all know quite well what Jesus would say to everything. You know He would be sick of much of what he would see if He walked into our homes. That at least we recognize this is important. That we do feel uneasy about some of our excess and indifference and sin is important. At least it shows that He did not die on that Cross for nothing. If, as the third stanza of today's entrance hymn states: "*And when I think that God, His Son not sparing, sent Him to die, I scarce can take it in— That on the Cross my burden gladly bearing, He bled and died to take away my sin*" Jesus was serious about our souls to the point of His crucifixion, we must feel some responsibility to fix up our houses!

We sing '*How great Thou art*' and we realize that God's greatness demands that we be serious about Him and about our commitment to honor life. We sing '*How great Thou art*' and we know deep in our hearts that God wants nothing less than everything from us. God is great and God is good! He's not crabby—He just wants to be loved.

Marry Month of June

No, I did not misspell the first word in the caption above. Many a wedding takes place in the month of June. And, so it is very appropriate to reflect on the married state— that requires plenty of sacrifice and tender loving care. The following are some reflections pertinent to marriage given to us by some of the wise folks who preceded us.

Jesus quoted the verse from Genesis 2:24... **“A man must leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and the two will become one body.”**

Someone once said: “Don’t over-analyze your marriage; it’s like yanking up a fragile indoor plant every 20 minutes to see how its roots are growing.

A certain rabbi by the name of Brickner once stated, “Success in marriage is more than *finding* the right person; it is a matter of *being* the right person.”

St. Francis de Sales is quoted as saying, “The state of marriage is one that requires more virtue and constancy than any other; it is a perpetual exercise of mortification.”

Someone quipped humorously about the first occupants in the Garden of Eden saying, “Adam and Eve had an ideal marriage. He didn’t have to hear about all the men she could have married—and she didn’t have to hear about the way his mother cooked.”

The Art of Marriage...

A good marriage must be created.

In the marriage, the little things are the big things.

It is never being too old to hold hands.

It is remembering to say ‘I love you’ at least once each day.

It is never going to sleep angry.

It is having a mutual sense of values and common objectives.

It is standing together and facing the world.

It is forming a circle of love that gathers in the whole family.

It is speaking words of appreciation.

It is demonstrating gratitude in thoughtful ways.

It is having the capacity to forgive and forget.

It is giving each other an atmosphere in which each can grow.

It is a common search for the good and the beautiful.

When I think of my mom and dad, I can’t help but to think of the many wonderful people here at St. Stanislaus Church who remained faithful to their vows; how they raised their children in the midst of wars, economic depression, racial tensions, unemployment and cultural instability. Yet, like countless couples in the world, they made the necessary sacrifices to raise children that became for us—priests, nuns, pilots, doctors and nurses, bakers and butchers, teachers and coaches, beauticians and actresses, astronauts and scientists, musicians and athletes, lawyers and bankers, and the list goes on.

As Fr Mike, Fr. Placyd, Br. Justin and I make visits to the hospitals, nursing homes and private residences, we witness the tremendous love that spouses have for each other—how they tend to the needs of a bed-ridden husband or wife; how they console each other and journey together towards heaven in mutual trust and love.

... postanowił udać się do Jerozolimy i wysłał przed sobą posłańców...



W dzisiejszym świecie mówi się coraz chętniej o nietolerancji wobec mniejszości. Media podchwytyją te tematy, które łatwo się sprzedają.

Nietrudno w takim zamieszaniu zapomnieć, że czasami większość też może być prześladowana... Na przykład z powodu wiary.

Księża, załatwiając przeróżne sprawy, najczęściej parafialne, trafiają do bardzo wielu miejsc i spotykają najrozmaitszych ludzi. Czasami głęboko wierzących i gorliwie praktykujących, a niekiedy obojętnych, czy nawet wrogo nastawionych do Kościoła. Koloratka, habit - jednoznacznie mówi, kto kim jest i najczęściej bardzo pomaga. Pobudza życzliwość, skłania do większej uprzejmości, otwiera wiele drzwi, uruchamia łańcuch pomocy. Niejeden człowiek wydaje się przekonany, że w ten sposób nie tylko księdzu pomaga... Bywają jednak i takie miejsca, gdzie koloratka nie jest mile widziana lub budzi niezrozumiałe zakłopotanie.

Judejczycy i Samarytanie wzajemnie gardzili swoimi miejscami świętymi. Było tak już przed zniszczeniem świątyni samarytańskiej w czasach króla żydowskiego Jana Hirkana, w II wieku przed Chrystusem. W odwecie, jeszcze prawie dwieście lat później, Samarytanie źle odnosili się do galilejskich Żydów zmierzających do Judei, co czasami prowadziło do aktów przemocy.

Mamy w dzisiejszej Ewangelii kilka wątków. Jest najpierw wzmianka o „wypełnieniu się czasu” i podróży Jezusa do Jerozolimy dla ostatecznego spełnienia Jego misji. Jest dalej wątek nadgorliwych uczniów, którzy – jakby to rzeczywiście od nich zależało – chcą wymierzać sprawiedliwość ogniem z **n i e b a**. I jest w końcu potrójna odpowiedź tym, którzy chcą iść za Chrystusem.

Łukasz Ewangelista pisząc o samarytańskiej wiosce, która nie przyjęła Jezusa, nie potrafi wyzwolić się od obrazu miłosiernego Samarytanina, tak dobrze nam znanego z przypowieści. Tam pomaga on człowiekowi, który potrzebuje pomocy. Nie pyta, kim jest, skąd pochodzi, jaką wyznaje wiarę. Natomiast inni Samarytanie, słysząc, kim jest Jezus, ze względu na Jego wiarę odmawiają gościny.

Może ktoś się obruszy na zestawienie tych dwóch fragmentów z Ewangelii. Można zauważyć, w jaki sposób jedno słowo „wierzę” może zmienić nastawienie człowieka. Dla drugiego człowieka - obcego, nieznanego - można zrobić coś dobrego w sposób zwyczajny, naturalny. Gdy jednak ktoś otwarcie mówi o swojej wierze lub przyznaje się do swoich poglądów, sytuacja się zmienia.

Pierwsze uczucia, jakie rodzą się w nas, gdy ktoś odrzuca nas z powodu wiary, te uczucia mogą być niestety podobne do tych z Ewangelii. Możemy w pierwszej chwili zareagować jak apostołowie, nie wolno jednak zapomnieć, co powiedział do nich Pan Jezus. To właśnie jest czas świadectwa... „Jeżeli Mnie prześladowali, to i was będą prześladować” (J 15,20).

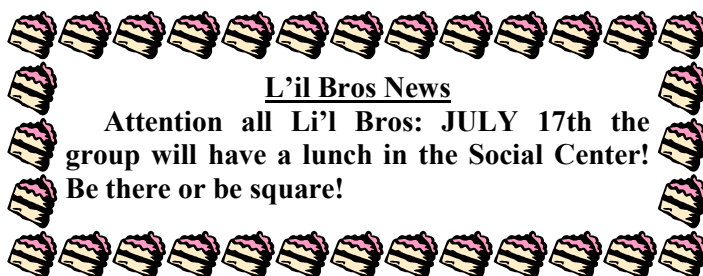
