

"Black Madonna"....Part II

So, what happened in 1430 that affected the icon? The monastery was attacked by a group of Hussites (Protestant followers of John Huss) who not only plundered the sanctuary but also tried to destroy the icon. The slashes which are now painted on every version of this icon date from this attack. The damage to the icon was quite extensive, so much so that it was necessary to have it undergo its first of many restorations. The temporary repairs to the icon proved inadequate, thus by 1433 the monks sought the expertise of court painters who were acquainted with the Byzantine-Macedonian and Byzantine-Ruthenian styles of painting. Their attempts at restoration having proved to be unsuccessful, the work was then assigned to the 'imperial' artists who restored the painting.

What was involved in this restoration? The original planks were preserved, but needed to be mended. To these original planks a canvas was added and covered in gesso. Then the artists copied the images of Mary and Jesus from the damaged original. The end result was a departure from the pure Byzantine linear/two dimensional style to a more tender, less severe style influenced by the contemporary styles of the mid-15th century. The newer look contained half-tints and softer outlines. At that point the icon took on a look which combined the cultures of the East and the West, a result quite reflective of the culture and history of the country in general.

Future restorations occurred over the centuries, but the icon basically remained the same, its painted slashes and colors only slightly altered. The 'blackness' is sometimes more obvious on copies of the icon than on the 'original.' Take for example the version in our own shrine—it is much darker than the one at Częstochowa, but it was actually painted that dark in the first place. Somehow, the idea of that darker image seemed to appeal to some artists. After all, Mary's and Jesus' skin would have been olive hued based on the geographical location of the Holy Land. Neither would have been white (as in northern European) or black (as in central African). If you've been to our church at Christmastime you would have seen an actual icon of Mary and Jesus placed at the steps of the sanctuary. When I commissioned that icon I asked Marek Czarnecki, the iconographer, to write the faces as they would have looked prior to the desecration on the 15th century. Thus, we now see a much more accurate version to the original than most others venerated today.

When was the last time you knelt in front of our 'icon' of Mary and Jesus? What do you see when you look into their faces? Do you look at both of them? Did you ever notice where He is looking? Do you only focus on the scars? Do you feel her eyes burning into your heart? Does Mary seem strong? Is she happy with you? Does she seem mother-like? Does her look indicate that she will whisper your prayers into the ear of her Son? Does she look like the Mother of Mercy? Do you sense a presence in that part of the shrine church that defies words? Are you afraid to hear what she might say to you? St. Stanislaus and John Paul are nudging you with the words beneath their own feet..."don't be afraid!"

THANK YOU, SISTER!

In the study of philosophy and logic, there is a phrase "necessary but not sufficient" to describe certain conditions of being. It means that there are some elements of our normal human life that must be in place, but they alone are not enough to be completely fulfilling. For example, we absolutely need the basics

like food, water, and shelter. But these alone do not make us truly human. They are necessary, but not sufficient.

Words are like that — necessary, but not sufficient. Sometimes words alone are not enough. We need to say certain things, but the words alone are not enough. Inadequate to the necessary and joyful task of gratitude, the words "Thank you" are sometimes too frail to carry the great weight of thankfulness that needs to be brought to those who have done much for us. Yes, they must be spoken — even proclaimed — from the heart. But often we need more than words. We need an action, a gesture, an outward sign of what lay deep in our hearts.

Next weekend, the Saint Stanislaus community will say "Thank you" to the Sisters of the Holy Family of Nazareth, and we will do this with words and with actions. The sisters across the whole country are celebrating this year as their jubilee, 125 years of their presence in the United States. Their first ministry at Saint Stanislaus was in the newly built (1907) elementary school, where the sisters still carry on their ministry to our children. Of course, as the needs of the People of God have changed, so has the generous response of the sisters in their ministries, encompassing many and varied forms of outreach and presence.

Ten years after having arrived at Saint Stanislaus, the parish constructed a massive new (1917) convent building containing dozens of private rooms as well as several large rooms for living out the requirements of common life. The large building was needed to house the sisters who taught at what was at one time the largest parochial school in the United States — right here! Over time, the smaller number of sisters were able to be more comfortably in a smaller and more home-like setting, currently in the old Mosinski family home across from the rectory. Of course, the convent building also had seen its day, having served the community well until its demolition last year.

Just as the life of the sisters has changed over the decades, so has our campus. Where there had once been a large building to house the sisters, now there is a beautiful and peaceful new park dedicated in their honor — Nazareth Park, a commitment to a long future in a new way. Likewise, we are happy to recommission the fourth floor of the school building, which had been closed for 57 years and is now a sign of future commitment to the ministry so loved by the sisters for over a century.

Just as our land and buildings build on the past and create a new future, so also do we pray that the life of the Sisters of the Holy Family of Nazareth will continue to build on their proud legacy, and that God will continue to bless them with new sisters to create their new future of service, modeling their lives on the hidden life and virtues of that first Holy Family.

Miłość i obojętność

Współczesny człowiek cechuje się wieloma uzależnieniami. I to nie tylko chodzi o tak wielkie uzależnienia, jak uzależnienie od alkoholu, czy narkotyków. Dzisiejszy człowiek staje się niewolnikiem rzeczy, które posiada: samochodu, komórki, konta bankowego, używek. Wówczas, nieświadomie, sam sobie człowiek buduje więzienie, z którego potem trudno mu się wyzwolić. Z takiej postawy wypływa wiele grzechów i zbrodni.



Św. Paweł napisał szereg listów pasterskich. Są to traktaty, w których autor poucza, daje wskazówki, upomina. Wśród tych listów zachował się jeden, pisany własnoręcznie, krótki, bez żadnych wykładów i pouczeń. List wspaniały, pisany sercem.

Nie wiem, czy w ciągu wieków powiedziano kiedykolwiek więcej słów o miłości niż w naszych czasach. Ciągle mówi się o wielkich problemach: umierający z głodu, samotni, analfabeci, biedni, wyzyskiwani, więzieni, chorzy. Konferencje, spotkania, odczyty, uchwały... Ale równocześnie nie wiem, czy w historii był wiek tak opanowany przez obojętność, jak nasz. Obojętność i nieczułość, to groźna choroba naszych czasów. Przejawów jest wiele. Chciałbym zwrócić uwagę na dwa.

Współczesną obojętność można porównać do choroby dalekowidza. Ludzie dostrzegają wielkie problemy ludzkości: głodnych w Indiach, trędowatych na Madagaskarze, więźniów w Chile, a nie widzą głodnego chłopca na tej samej klatce schodowej, chorego na serce we własnym domu, kolegi z pracy przebywającego w więzieniu. Są ludzie, którzy potrafią pisać artykuły o miłości, o człowieku, o odpowiedzialności, ale nie zorganizują pomocy dla starca leżącego od pięciu lat za ich ścianą. Widzą problemy, nie widzą człowieka.

Matkę Teresę z Kalkuty zapytał ktoś, czy nie przerażają jej tłumy ludzi w nędzy? Odpowiedziała: "Nigdy nie pielęgnuję tłumów, tylko jedną osobę. Zaczynam od jednej osoby, potem, jeśli mogę, zajmuję się następną. Gdybym patrzyła na tłumy, nie zaczęłabym nigdy".

Prawdziwa miłość wie, że nie można nakarmić tłumów, trzeba zadbać o człowieka. Prawdziwa miłość jest konkretna i dlatego nigdy nie jest obojętna. Miłość zawsze widzi przede wszystkim tych, którzy są blisko, i od nich zaczyna.

Jeśli chcę być uczniem Chrystusa przyjmuję całą Ewangelię. Jeśli przyjmę Ewangelię bez radykalnych wymagań Jezusa, to mogę sobie udawać chrześcijanina, ale chrześcijaninem nie będę. Jest jedna wiara, jedna miłość, jeden chrzest i jedna Ewangelia – taka sama dla wszystkich, bez wykrajania, rozmydlania i łagodzenia.

Drugi objaw obojętności to znieczulica, to zwapnienie serca. Dla miłości rzeczy małe są równie ważne, jak i wielkie, a w wielu wypadkach są nawet ważniejsze od wielkich. Wielkie zdarzają się rzadko, z małych składa się życie.

Zwapnione przez obojętność serce nie reaguje na drobiazgi, nie interesuje się łzą, która spływa po policzku dziecka, siwym włosem, który pojawił się na głowie niegdyś kochanej osoby, słabością kolegi, który po trzech miesiącach szpitala przybył do pracy. Św. Paweł nie tylko pięknie mówił o miłości, nie tylko o niej pisał, ale nią żył.

Każdy z nas dobrze wie, że każda Eucharystia, to moment, w którym składa się na ołtarzu dary naszego życia. Czy nie warto dzisiaj, podczas tej Eucharystii złożyć, to, co nam w głębszym oddaniu dla Chrystusa przeszkadza, może nawet już od wielu lat? Jezus takim darem nie pogardzi, bo to może stać się wydarzeniem świadomego i wolnego polegania na Nim. Jemu na tym zależy i nie dla tego, żeby On miał z tego jakiś zysk, ale abyśmy my już szli przez życie bez żadnych ograniczeń, pogubienia i uzależnień.
