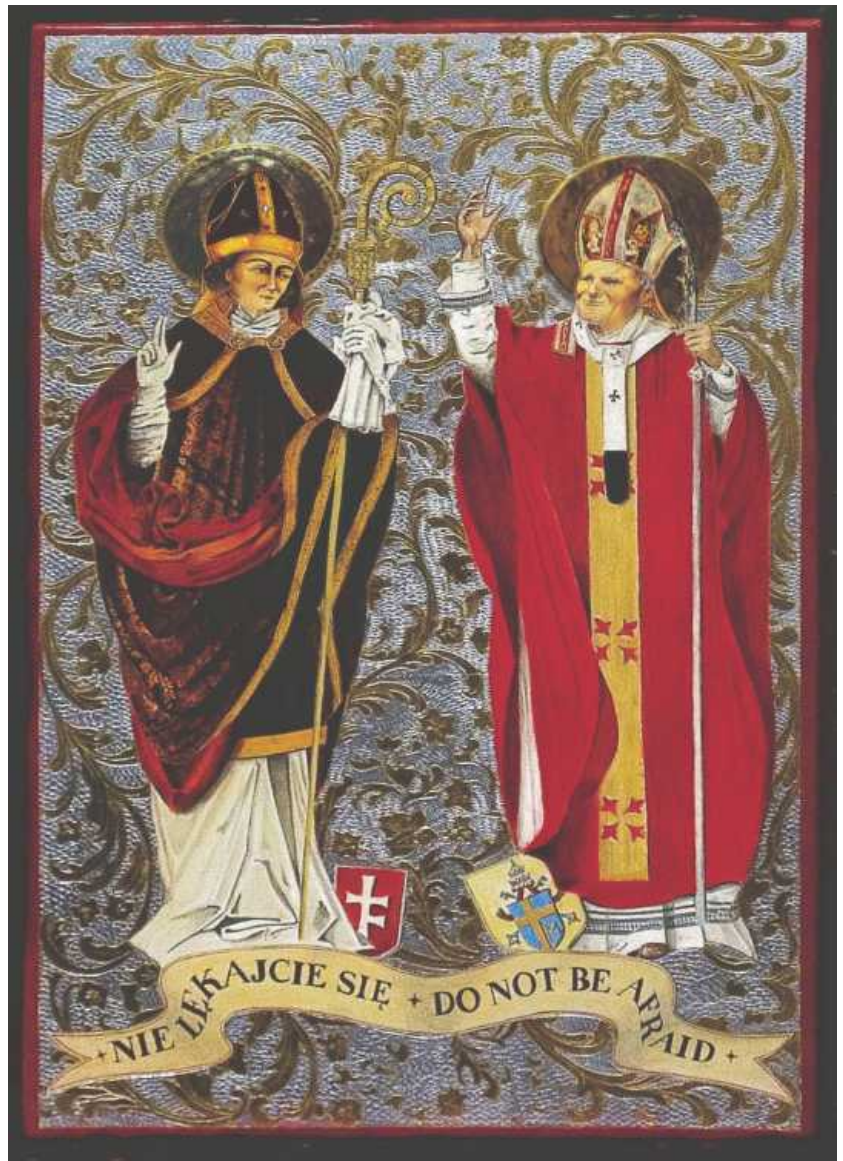

WE'RE HAVING A PARTY...
...and it would be great if you could come! Next Sunday, August 14, the parish will celebrate the 25th anniversary of Fr. Michael's vows as a Franciscan Friar. (The actual date is August 15, the Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, which is also the feast of the Province.) All are welcome to attend the 11:30 mass, when Fr. Michael will renew his vows, and then to gather in the Social Center for a simple celebration.



AND WITH YOUR SPIRIT

Ok, I not going to talk about THAT again...but I thought if I throw that phrase in periodically it will eventually become more and more natural for all of us to remember and say at Mass.. We've been busy preparing for the various liturgical revisions/translations at the rectory the past few months. Soon the choir will meet and learn a new Mass Ordinary (The Mass of St. Paul the Apostle) chosen by our bishop for use throughout the diocese. Once the choir is familiar with the various Mass parts (Gloria, Sanctus, Memorial Acclamations, Amen and Agnus Dei) they will begin to sing those parts prior to every weekend Mass in order for everyone to become accustomed to the new texts and music. We will then slowly introduce these new musical/textual Mass parts into our liturgies so that everyone may sing along and become totally familiar with the new texts. Before you know it, we'll barely remember the old versions. In case anyone would like to hear these Mass parts and has access to a computer, you can already hear them by logging onto various websites, but I suggest you visit the website of the new missal we will be using here at the church come Advent. It is as follows: [http:// www.ocp.org/newmasssettings](http://www.ocp.org/newmasssettings). **AND WITH YOUR SPIRIT!** When we get to the point that the congregation will be invited to sing along, the music and words for these various parts will be provided for everyone's use.

During Autumn we will see the transition into the revised translation with a variety of catechetical tools (bulletin inserts etc...) provided to everyone to enable each parishioner to deepen their understanding of the beauty and mystery of the Mass. We will provide written aids as well as spoken instructions, each to be seen in terms as an opportunity for growth in personal faith as well as a growth as a congregation. We do so many things in this church that oftentimes it seems that we forget our main purpose. We hope that every parishioner will take up the challenge for growth with an opened mind and allow the spirit to work in us toward the common goal of the glory of God. The Eucharist must be the most important thing we do!! **AND WITH YOUR SPIRIT!**

The official date for the complete transition from one translation to the new one is the first Sunday of Advent. At that time you will see the new missals provided for each congregant to replace our current one. It is a missal published by Oregon Catholic Press, the missal used by most churches of the Cleveland diocese. It is an annual missal containing readings, important texts, songs etc...for the entire year. Likewise, the Polish congregation will have an additional hymnal to encourage a more active participation during Mass.

We will also implement all the rubrics that have already been published for all Roman Catholic churches to abide by and incorporate all of these rubrical details in both the Polish and English liturgies. For the most part we have been abiding by these rules for some time...but some details seem to have been overlooked. It is our goal to implement all the rules and regulations as expected of us by the Holy See. It is a goal of all bishops that each congregation follow those rules and revisions so that whether visiting a church in Ohio or in Alaska, one would know they are in a Roman Catholic church in union with Rome and each other. If everyone takes this seriously, it can happen. As with the original liturgical revisions back in the 1960's this approach will face opposition from both sides (sounds like Washington DC, right??). Being a Shrine Church we have a special obligation to be faithful to the magisterium and to faithfully abide by its wishes. As we together take on these challenges, please do not hesitate to ask any one of us on the pastoral staff for clarifications or explanations. We will all try our best to make this occasion one for us all to grow in faith, hope and charity.

SOLID AS THE ROCK

The above caption, as you well know, refers to Saint Peter, the great apostle and first Pope of the Catholic Church. Thanks to Patrick Marrin, editor of *Celebration* publication, I am able to present a few thoughts for reflection about Peter the Apostle. We will meet him in the next three Sunday gospel readings: Peter walking on the water, Peter proclaiming Jesus as the Messiah and being called the rock and keeper of the keys, and Peter being sharply rebuked for resisting Jesus' prediction of his coming suffering and death.

We know much about Peter from the other stories: his call to leave fishing to become Jesus' most trusted disciple; the story of the miraculous catch of fish; the healing of his mother-in-law; his presence at the Transfiguration with James and John; at the Last Supper and his reluctance to have Jesus wash his feet; his triple denial of Jesus; and his key role as witness to the Resurrection. He is mentioned in the Acts of the Apostles.

Peter left us all lessons in humble leadership. He possessed many strengths and many weaknesses, but he retained and passed on to us the mind and heart of Christ.

In the year 64, as we all know from history, We know that the madman, Nero, had all "subversives", the poor in the slums, the slaves, etc. rounded up and put to death in various ways. Peter was no exception. There he was in a cell, lying awake through the night, praying silently, listening to the other prisoners in adjoining cells, many weeping out of fear, others offering encouragement, even leading the rest in familiar hymns. Peter was a high-value prisoner, the leader of the outlawed sect.

From stumbling block to cornerstone, Simon Peter had lived the gospel he would announce to others. This was why Jesus appointed him leader. They would see in his face the same look of love Jesus had shown him and know that he was telling the truth. "Don't be afraid. God's love has pursued you even in your sin, found you and given you new life."

Simon Peter felt relieved to know that the end of life was near. His long life and labors spanned worlds and, it seemed, several lifetimes, beginning in Galilee, grounded in his intense Jewish faith, then exploding into the larger, diverse cultures in Antioch, expanding even further during the missionary years across Asia Minor, the cities of Greece and onto Rome.

Peter watched as the church he helped to form moved slowly past the bars of his cell. He found his thoughts turning to the future when the greatest danger would not be persecution but success. Both the scriptures and the Greek storytellers had it right: Adversity builds character, but if you really want to know what people are like, give them power.

Soldiers were at the door of his cell. A rough wooden cross lay on the blood-soaked sand of the arena, where the first group of Christians were struck down. Peter thought about the humility Jesus had shown, the Beloved Son accepting the death of a slave, teaching, always teaching, right up to the last moment.

He approached the cross, knelt and stretched his body on it upside down, facing the imperial box. How can I imitate the Master and leave a final lesson about the kind of leader he taught me to be?

666 - „liczba Bestii” (2/3)

We fragmencie z Księgi Syracyclesa cytowanym tydzień temu było stwierdzenie o Salomonie, że ten najmądrzejszy z ludzi w swojej młodości, stał się na starość głupim. Na czym polegało to „ogłupienie” Salomona w jego starości? Mądrość w sensie biblijnym jest bardzo praktyczna. To nie tyle inteligencja czy wykształcenie w dzisiejszym rozumieniu tego słowa, ale prowadzenie zbożnego życia, zachowanie Bożych przykazań, życie w łasce Bożej. Według Biblii mądrym jest człowiek niewykształcony, ale żyjący w łasce i zachowujący Boże przykazania; głupcem natomiast jest profesor prowadzący grzeszne życie.

Salomon w wieku dojrzałym odszedł od pierwotnej wierności Bogu Izraela. Jego grzech polegał na tym, że uległ pokusom: posiadania, władzy i doświadczenia rokoszy. Wszystkie trzy stały się sidłem dla niego. Obdarzony przez Pana Boga wielkimi darami używał je nie dla Jego chwały, ale dla siebie. Przez przymierza polityczne kraj przez niego rządzony osiągnął potęgę, której nie miał wcześniej ani nigdy po nim. W 1 Krl 10:23-25 czytamy, że Salomon przewyższył wszystkich królów ziemi w bogactwie i mądrości i że każdy z nich składał mu dorocznie swoje dary. Ponieważ przymierza polityczne łączyły się w tym czasie z zawieraniem małżeństw, Salomon miał 700 żon i 300 nadożnic. One skłoniły go, że palił kadzidło obcym bogom.

Św. Jan pisząc Apokalipsę podaje liczbę 666. Jest to liczba Bestii, a zarazem liczba człowieka. O co tu chodzi? Jak rozumieć przesłanie tej sławetnej liczby? Człowiek został stworzony, tak samo jak zwierzęta w szóstym dniu, dlatego liczba „6” odnosi się zarówno do człowieka, jak i do zwierząt. Jednak w odróżnieniu od zwierząt, przeznaczeniem człowieka jest odpoczynek dnia siódmego – człowiek stworzony w szóstym dniu, został stworzony DLA dnia siódmego, czyli do wspólnoty z Panem Bogiem, który po zakończeniu stworzenia odpoczął w dniu szabatu. Kusiciel, anioł, który utracił miejsce w niebie, pałając zazdrością o istotę uczynioną z prochu ziemi, która teraz może zająć jego miejsce w niebie, pragnie „zamknąć” człowieka w dniu szóstym; pragnie, aby ten pozostał na poziomie „zwierzęcym”, tzn. pragnie, aby zainteresowania człowieka nie wychodziły poza posiadanie, władzę i przyjemność. Odwieczne pokusy towarzyszące człowiekowi. I zarazem odwieczna walka duchowa w sercu każdego człowieka między powołaniem do „dnia siódmego” (wspólnota z Panem Bogiem), a ciężarem ciągnącym w dół, z powrotem do „dnia szóstego” (pozostanie na poziomie cielesności). Z tych samych powodów, antychryst, w Księdze Apokalipsy został nazwany „Bestią”, tzn. zwierzęciem, ponieważ odrzucił Boże powołanie do wspólnoty z Nim, i pozostał na poziomie „dnia szóstego”, czyli zwierzęcym lub cielesnym. Obdarzony ogromnymi duchowymi darami (możemy tylko przeczuwać, że większymi niż Salomon), nie dziękował za nie Bogu, nie oddał chwały Dawcy tych darów, ale postawił się w Jego miejsce, żądając dla siebie czci należnej tylko Panu Bogu. ST. STANS HISTORICAL FACT by *Rob Jagelewski*. The priest who built our present church arrived as Pastor in 1883. In an article in the *Plain Dealer* in 1891 just before the church was opened, Father Kolaszewski talked about his arrival at St. Stanislaus. "When I first started my duties here I found nothing but the property; a house, without hardly a chair, and no bed to lie on. I was only too happy to accept the hospitality of Father Gallagher (Holy Name) of Newburgh and at night I slept in his house... We had a little school with fifty-eight children taught by two Sisters... My school today contains 865 pupils with one lay teacher and eleven teachers. I rallied my congregation to secure enough funds to build a house (first rectory) and a little later a schoolhouse, and now the church."
