



#### WELCOME, FR. JOHN!

This weekend we are happy to welcome Fr. John Puodziunas, OFM, who is the Provincial Minister of the friars at Saint Stanislaus. He will speak at all the Masses and formally present to the parish Fr. Bob Konopa, OFM, as the interim administrator of the parish. Fr. Bob officially began his service last Thursday and will continue until the end of June.

#### WHO CHOSE YOU? WHO APPOINTED YOU?

In today's first reading God comes right out and tells David "It was I who took you from the pasture and from the care of the flock to be commander of my people Israel...." It was what God wanted and David was who God wanted. He chose David.

In the Gospel we hear of yet another chosen person: Mary! She was chosen from by God to be the living tabernacle of His Son. She was chosen by God, not the other way around. Because of her acceptance of that proposition we too are now chosen to join the procession up to Calvary and into paradise as anointed beings at our Baptism.

#### It was not you who chose me, says the Lord, but I who chose you !!!!

The song we will sing today during our Communion procession will reflect this theme. The words are actually the Communion antiphon for the feast of St. Charles Borromeo, patron of priests. Yet we share a priesthood poured over us by the Holy Spirit. We carry the Body and Blood of Christ into the world as we freely accept it in during the communion rite. We proclaim to the world that Jesus lives and lives through each one of us. That is why it is so important that we are truly ready to accept this gift and execute this reality. The reception of the Eucharist is not meant to be an act of magi. It is not meant to be a personal devotion hidden from the world. The reception of the Eucharist is an active acceptance to share in the evangelization of the world.

#### It was not you who chose me , says the Lord, but I who chose you!!!!

Upon the reception of the Eucharist each of us becomes an instrument of peace as much as an instrument of battle. The former is displayed in our acts of charity and kindness to the poor, the lonely, the abandoned, the imprisoned, the sick. The latter is displayed by our active denial of all evil that tries to inhibit any and all of us from doing good to others throughout the world. That evil can be as subtle as partaking in any passive action which dampens our sensitivity to those in need to the other extreme of becoming obviously involved in the promotion and execution of acts of justice and equality on all levels of society. Whether rich or poor, injustice and evil affects us all. Whether white or black, yellow or red, injustice is a fungus on the society which chooses to look the other way, to ignore human dignity, to deny God given rights.

#### It was not you who chose me, says the Lord, but I who chose you!!!

From the moment of our Baptism we have been anointed to "go and bear fruit that will last." From the moment we breathed in the breath of God we became inebriated with that Spirit, energized with that passion to win the battle against evil and to spread the message of love proclaimed by the sacrifice of Christ. Our weapon of destruction is the nourishment provided by the Eucharist, a nourishment that will sustain us if we so choose, renew the face of the earth if we have courage, and bless the name of God in our simple acts of kindness and compassion. Go for it! Go and live what you have received! Go and become lights in the world burdened with darkness! David Krakowski

#### PASTORAL MESSAGE



#### GOD IS EVERYWHERE—THANKS BE TO GOD

A little girl sat on her grandfather's lap. Looking up into his face, she touched his wrinkled old cheek. Then she touched her own smooth cheek and asked, "Grandpa, did God make you?"

"Yes," he answered, "God made me a long time ago." Then she asked, "Did God make me too?"

Grandpa replied, "Yes, of course, honey.

But God made you just a little while ago."

Checking her own smooth face again, the little girl said, "God's getting better at it, isn't he?"

In today's Gospel, Mary learns that she will give birth to the Son of God. Mary will soon be privileged to look upon her newborn child and to let her lips be the first to kiss the perfect cheeks of the face of God.

In many cities in our country banks stand out in all their architectural magnificence. These impressive edifices attest to what people value most — money.

In ancient times this was not the case. Besides the palatial residences of rulers, the most beautiful structures in most cities were the temples to the gods. Temples were regarded as places gods and human beings could commune with one another. This prompted David to a temple to the God of Israel and Judah. Unlike the temples of the gods that housed an image or statue of their god, the Jerusalem temple would house the Ark of the Covenant, which symbolized the presence of God with the Israelites—even in their time of captivity.

God is the architect of the universe, designer of every natural wonder, liberator of refugees, caretaker and protector of all that is. God has no need of a temple, for God's presence is all-pervasive. God cannot be confined to any one place or to any one people. Throughout history this lesson was driven home to the Israelites through its psalmists, prophets and sages. God was with them in Egypt, in the tent pitched in the desert, as they settled in Canaan, and present with them as they were in the Babylonian exile. God was with as they returned home from exile.

Given God's power to be anywhere and everywhere, the Incarnation (The Son of God becoming a human being) is all the more wondrous—what a mystery that would choose to take up residence within the confines of the human condition. In today's Gospel gives words to this mystery as Mary is honored as the living temple of God made flesh. As this mystery gradually unfolded, it was clear that the God who became flesh in Jesus also wished to claim other human addresses. The baptized now house the Spirit of God; they are, in fact, God's temple.


With these ideas in mind, we prepare to welcome the God who comes, mindful that God is already present in the sacred, living word; in the sacraments; and, in a very significant way, within every human being. God's presence is not confined to the temple Solomon built, or to Jerusalem, or to Rome or St. Peter's. God's presence can also be known at Mecca, in Beijing, and Japan. God's presence seeks out a welcome in Muslims, Jews, Christians, Hindus, Sikhs, Buddhists and unbelievers.

Those who welcome the divine presence become holy people, holy places of encounter with God. Through their eyes, God sees, and through their ears God hears. Through their feet, the good news of God's abiding presence can be carried to all those dark and thin places that ache for the light of truth and justice. When we come to kneel before the crèche and remember that time long ago when Jesus became flesh in Mary, now we know that we are the crèche where God chooses to present to a needy world.

#### WIGILIA

Wigilia Bożego Narodzenia w tradycji polskiej jest najbardziej uroczystym i wzruszającym wieczorem roku. Posiada Ona bardzo bogatą liturgię domową. Jej geneza sięga pierwszych wieków chrześcijaństwa. Wigilia znana już była w Starym Testamencie. Obchodzono ją przed każdą uroczystością, a nawet przed szabatem. Było to przygotowanie do odpoczynku świgtecznego. Izraelici zwali "wieczorem". Słowo "wigilia" pochodzi z języka łacińskiego i oznacza czuwanie przed ważną uroczystością. W Polsce wigilia weszła na stałe do tradycji w XVIII wieku. Główną jej częścią jest uroczysta wieczerza złożona z postnych potraw. Ma ona charakter ściśle rodzinny. W Polsce znany jest zwyczaj pozostawiania wolnego miejsca przy stole wigilijnym dla osób spoza grona rodzinnego, szczególnie "przygodnego gościa". Pozostawiając wolne miejsce przy stole wyrażamy również pamięć o naszych bliskich, którzy nie mogą spędzić W Polsce wieczerzę wigilijną rozpoczynało się, świąt z nami. ady na niebie ukazała się pierwsza gwiazda. Czyniono to zapewne na pamiątkę gwiazdy betlejemskiej, o której pisze w swojej Ewangelii św. Mateusz. Najważniejszym i kulminacyjnym momentem wieczerzy wigilijnej.

W Polsce jest zwyczaj łamania się opłatkiem. Czynność ta następuje po przeczytaniu Ewangelii o Narodzeniu Pańskim. Tradycja ta pochodzi od prastarego zwyczaju tzw. "eulogiów", jaki zachował się z pierwszych wieków chrześcijaństwa. Zwyczaj łamania się opłatkiem nawiązuje do Ostatniej Wieczerzy, jak również oznacza poświęcenie się jednych dla drugich. Składamy sobie życzenia pomyślności i darujemy Wieczerza wigilijna jest posiłkiem postnym, ale nasi przodkowie(my również) potrafili uczynić z tego ograniczenia prawdziwą ucztę dla podniebienia, tak, że polski post słynął szeroko na całym świecie. Po wieczerzy wigilijnej śpiewamy kolędy i oczekujemy na Mszę św. sprawowaną o Północy zwang "Pasterkg".
