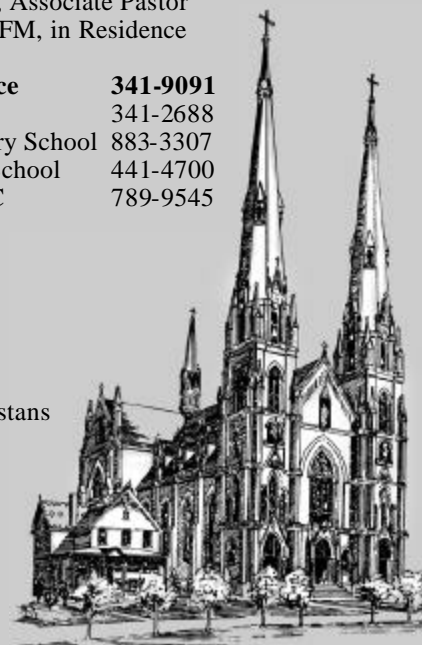

Beyond Independence Day

'Freedom' —a word so easily abused, misunderstood, hijacked and diluted. The word was bantered around last week midst fireworks, shootings (in Cleveland as in Iraq as in any society touched by the 'culture of death'), political pontification and editorial constipation. At our liturgical gathering on the 4th of July, those of us present thanked God for our national freedom, a freedom won in the 18th century, secured by brave fighters and made a little more secure by the Atlantic ocean. But, as pointed out in Fr. Michael's homily on that day as well as in the homily of Fr. George (the Vincentian missionary) last weekend, true freedom, i.e., the freedom which alone comes from Christ, is the treasure which we all desire in our innermost selves.

We should glory in the Cross of our Lord, Jesus Christ; for He is our salvation, our life and resurrection. Through Him we are saved and made free.

Jesus hands us this supreme freedom from His Cross. With hands nailed to that Cross His blood created a river of freedom unlike none other, there for all to drink. The freedom won back by that act of selfless love is the freedom which knows no boundaries. It is a freedom which may be had by Clevelanders as by Romans, by prisoners as by royalty, by any and all of God's children—if they are not afraid to accept it.

We should glory in the Cross of our Lord, Jesus Christ; for He is our salvation, our life and resurrection. Through Him we are saved and made free.

Last Sunday Fr. George mentioned a litany of roadblocks to the freedom offered by Jesus: materialism, physiological hedonism, chemical dependence, indifference and other de-humanizing shackles. His message was an appeal to all to accept the liberation offered from the crucified Christ. The things of the world will never liberate, but, rather, create obstacles to the full attainment of the freedom Christ won for us.

We should glory in the Cross of our Lord, Jesus Christ; for He is our salvation, our life and resurrection. Through Him we are saved and made free.

The mystery of faith is celebrated each time we gather as a congregation of believers, whether two or two thousand. We proclaim that by His cross and resurrection 'we are set free!' In that holy hour which began in the Upper Room and ended in the empty tomb we experience the liberation of humankind. We enter that holy hour each time we celebrate the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. We share in that mystery and plead for its liberating power and glory. It is God's love, His essence, which flows from the sacred pierced heart and alone can satisfy our thirst. Eat His flesh and drink His blood - and lose the shackles which prevent you from being truly free!

GOD DOES NOT WANT (JUST) YOUR SUNDAY



For those who remain faithful to their obligation to honor the Sabbath by coming to Mass with the community, we wonder why so many people skip Sunday Mass for other things. It is not so much frustrating as it is puzzling — God has given us so much, and all God wants is an hour back, so why can't we give it to

Him? But there is something lacking in the idea that all God wants is an hour on Sunday.

God wants everything.

If all I have to offer God in return is only an hour, then I am still cheating Him. In the readings this weekend, both the Old Testament and the Gospel remind us of this. From Deuteronomy: "...when you return to the Lord with **all** your heart and **all** your soul." And even more emphatically from Jesus in the

God does not want an hour on Sunday. He wants everything. But we need that hour on Sunday, and we need each other.

Gospel of Luke: "You shall love the Lord your God with **all** your heart, with **all** your being, with **all** your strength, and with **all** your mind..."

God does not need the hour on Sunday. God wants everything. But what about that hour? Well, **we** need that

hour. I need to be there, and I need to see you there too. During that hour, I need you. All of you. Each of you. And you need me. And you need each other. Everyone.

Remember the last line of the "Love your God" section of today's Gospel? "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." Love of God and love of neighbor go hand in hand. It's not that we do one first, then the other. Nor is it that one is more important than the other. They are one and the same. Talk about tough love!

Years ago, when I was still a young priest, there was a group of our eighth grade girls who attended 11:30 Mass together. Like good Catholics, they sat in the same pew every Sunday. Across the way was an elderly woman, who by now has certainly gone home to the Lord. Like many of our senior citizens, her personal holiness was so clear in its simplicity and concentrated prayer. One day this woman approached me and asked, "Father, who are those girls who sit in that pew every Sunday?" My instant reaction was one of concern and maybe impending anger. I assumed the girls had been disturbing her. What had these girls done to upset this old woman who is so peaceful in her prayer?

I explained that they went to our school and they agreed to meet every Sunday for Mass together. This old woman then said something that I remember to this day. She said, "I'm so glad that there are young people to continue with the faith that has meant so much to me. Father, when they are here, I pray better."

Imagine, a group of 13 year old girls, who might have bored out of their skin, were able to help a holy old woman to pray better — just by being there.

Dies Domini (2)

Zmartwychwstanie Jezusa „w pierwszym dniu tygodnia” spowodowało, że dla chrześcijan ten „pierwszy dzień” - początek stworzenia - stał się „dniem Panskim”, na który, poprzez wspólnotę stołu z Jezusem, w naturalny sposób przeszły istotne elementy starotestamentalnego szabatu (Benedykt XVI, „Jezus z Nazaretu”). O



powstrzymaniu się do pracy i o odpoczynku mówiliśmy w refleksji przed tygodniem. Dzisiaj chcę powiedzieć o samym sercu chrześcijańskiego świętowania niedzieli, a mianowicie o udziale w niedzielnej Mszy św.

Zmartwychwstanie Jezusa jest centralnym faktem, na którym opiera się nasza wiara. Niedziela jest najstarszym chrześcijańskim świętem ustanowionym na cześć zmartwychwstania Pana. Według starotestamentalnego sposobu liczenia dni, jest to „pierwszy dzień tygodnia” - dzień, w którym Pan Bóg rozpoczął dzieła stworzenia. Poprzez ten fakt niedziela nawiązuje do początków świata, czyli do jego stworzenia. Zarazem poprzez świętowanie zmartwychwstania Jezusa, niedziela wskazuje na to, co będzie na koncu czasów, kiedy wszystko zostanie spełnione. Widzimy więc, że niedziela łącząc w sobie „początek” i „koniec” wskazuje na Jezusa, który jest „Alfa i Omega” (Ap 1, 8) i na Boga, który jest „pierwszy i ostatni” (Iz 44, 6).

Przez świętowanie Eucharystii, niedziela staje się centrum życia wierzących. Wyznacza rytm życia ludu Bożego. Czasem słysze od ludzi, co dla nich znaczy udział w niedzielnej Mszy św. Gdy z jakiegos powodu nie uczestniczą w Eucharystii, czegos im brakuje w niedzielnym świętowaniu. To doswiadczenie ludzi wierzących wyraża prawdę: Bez Mszy św. niedziela traci sens jako dzień święty poświęcony Panu.

Niedziela jest zatem prawdziwie „Dies Domini” (dniem Panskim). Świętowanie niedzieli wyznacza rytm naszego życia i uswieca je. Istotnym elementem tego świętowania jest uczestnictwo w Eucharystii. Eucharystia oznacza „dziekczynienie”. Jest to dziekczynienie składane Panu Bogu za to wszystko, co dla nas uczynił. Dziękujemy za stworzenie świata i nasze. Dziękujemy za odkupienie dokonane w Jezusie. Dziękujemy za historię naszego życia. W Eucharystii jest zawarta cała historia zbawienia. Kiedy w niej bierzemy udział, to wtedy dzieje się coś wspaniałego i wyjątkowego: wplatamy historię nasze życia w historię zbawienia. Uczestnicząc z wiarą w niedzielnej Mszy św. stajemy się uczestnikami zbawienia; odkupienie staje się naszym udziałem.

Pełne uczestnictwo w Eucharystii to uczestnictwo połączone z przyjęciem Komunii św., bowiem Msza św. to uczta, na którą zaprasza sam Pan.

Eucharystia to także Ofiara. Tu przynosimy to wszystko, co trudne i bolesne dla nas, to co się w naszym życiu nie udało. Składamy to na ołtarzu, a wtedy dzięki Jezusowi zostaje to przemienione i nabiera sensu i nowej wartości. Dlatego ma sens uczestnictwo we Mszy św. i wtedy, kiedy chcemy z radości śpiewać, i kiedy przygniatają nas troski i smutki. Nasza radość staje się radością w Panu. W smutku znajdujemy umocnienie i pociechę.
