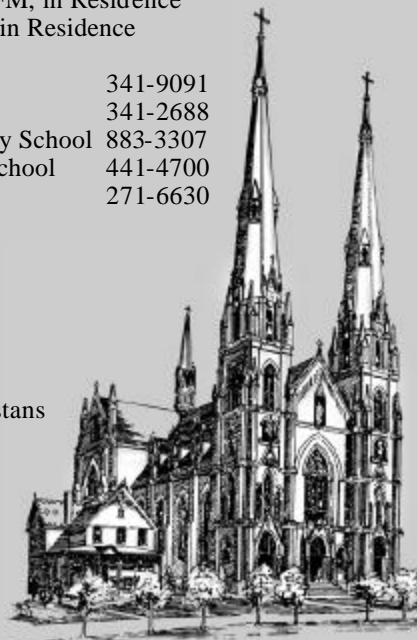

A Tombstone Discovered

The Victorian Gothic style of design and architecture which was popular in the 19th century (when our church was built and in which style this building was designed) seemed to delight in symbolism as well as an acute knowledge of historical details. One such detail came to my attention just the other day while sitting in the choir loft with our organ restorer. We were examining the window showing the ‘miracle of Piotrowin’ where the Bishop Stanislaus is seen with the character Piotr who had come back to life in order to testify on the behalf of Bishop Stanislaus in a court of law. (Stanilsaus was being accused of an inappropriate land transfer transaction by the authorities). There you can see Piotr stepping out of his grave, surrounded by astonished clergy and knights and other witnesses all taking place in the burial plots outside of Krakow. The city of Krakow looms in the background, however the structures pictured in this tableau, namely the Florian gate and the Barbican, did not yet exist as such at the time of Stanislaus’ life.

What I noticed in the background of this ‘scene’ was large stone or wall with Latin writing and what looked like a figure of a man. After closer scrutiny I realized that what I was looking at was the tombstone of the immediate predecessor of Stanisklus as Bishop of Krakow, Bishop Sula-Lambert. He had been Bishop of Krakow from 1061 to 1071. Thus the tombstone has his figure carved into its façade along with the inscription “+ *Ano Dom MCXXI Hodie XXV Novembris Lambe...*” (translation: November 25, 1071 A.D., Lambert). The figure in repose atop the stone is dressed in full priestly garb wearing a miter and holding the a book, most likely a Bible. (Stanislaus was anointed Bishop in 1072)

It was, no doubt, important to the designers of this window (signed and completed in 1891) to show the continuity of the ecclesial pedigree of the hierarchy in 11th century Poland. The country was in her infancy as far as Christianity is concerned having endured a widespread pagan rebellion around the time of Stanislaus’ birth (c. 1030) followed by an invasion of Bohemian forces into Silesia. But the ecclesiastic line was still traced back to the marriage of Mieszko and the Bohemian Princess, Dobrava in 965 and Mieszko’s baptism in 966. At that point in time Gniezno became the seat of the Primate of Poland, a position which her bishop will once again hold at the orders of John Paul II, this upon the death or retirement of Warsaw’s current bishop, Polish Primate Joseph Cardinal Glemp.

**EUCHARIST:
Taste & See the Goodness of the
Lord**

When was the last time you tasted and saw the goodness of the Lord? I hope you will reply: "At the last Eucharist (Mass) in which I participated." You may have tasted and seen the Lord's goodness in other events, but the highlight of tasting and seeing

the goodness of the Lord is at the Eucharist. Why?

At the Eucharist (Mass) God our Father provides for us the best of meals: the body and blood of His own Son. This may sound cannibalistic if we don't understand that at the Eucharistic table God offers us **the person** of His Son, Jesus. **The person** of Jesus is really present in the forms of bread and wine.

"*Body and blood*" are expressions to indicate **the whole** Christ. Even if we receive the Eucharist under the form of **bread alone** we receive **the whole person** of Christ. If we receive the Eucharist under the form of wine alone, we receive **the whole person of Christ**.

The whole person of Christ is the historical human and divine Jesus who has been glorified and vested with lordship. Always joined as head to the whole body of redeemed humanity, the one who receives him receives also receives the whole body of the Christ. that is, the members of the Church. They automatically come with Jesus.

The reason we are encouraged to eat **the** consecrated bread and to drink the consecrated wine is that Jesus said, "*Take, eat and drink.*" At the Last Supper the disciples both ate **and** drank. They received **the whole Christ** and so do we. We can't explain **how** this happens, but we believe **that** it happens.

Jesus is very emphatic about eating his body (flesh) and drinking blood to such a degree that he says that if we don't we won't have life in us.

About what kind of life is Jesus speaking? Once again he is speaking about the life of **the whole person**. He gives himself totally to benefit our life **totally**— whether that life is specified as physical, spiritual, emotional or relational.. The whole human being benefits from eating His body and drinking his blood.

The practical implications of this are many:

ONE, the Eucharist is not a thing but a person. It involves and should affect a personal relationship with Christ and with the persons of His body, the Church.

TWO, the Eucharist not only involves Jesus and me, but involves the whole body of the Christ. It benefits not only a part of Christ's body but the totality of His body.

THREE, the Eucharist, that is, the whole Mass with its readings from God's Word and its sacrificial banquet ought to be thought of as a feeding of the whole person, which lasts for an eternity.

Pray that we the Church may continue to "*taste and see the goodness of the Lord*" at Eucharist and that we might bless the Lord at all times. May His praise be ever in our mouths.

**EUCHARYSTIA
PAMIĄTKA, OFIARA, UCZTA**

Przez ostatnie niedziele słyszymy Ewangelie w których Jezus mówi o chlebie -Eucharystii, który z nieba zstępuje po to abyśmy mieli życie w sobie, to życie, które jest zadatkiem wieczności. W związku z tym, myślę, że warto poświęcić temu najważniejszemu z sakramentów więcej uwagi, stąd też to rozważenie.



Za czasów cesarza Dioklecjana grupa chrześcijan stanęła przed pogańskim sędzią Kartaginy oskarżona o udział w Eucharystii. Dekret wydany przez cesarza kategorycznie zabraniał chrześcijanom gromadzenia się na Eucharystię. Jeden z oskarżonych zapytany przez sędziego o powód przekroczenia woli cesarza oświadczył: "Czy mógłby być chrześcijaninem bez Eucharystii, albo Eucharystia bez chrześcijan? Czy nie wiesz, że jedno bez drugiego istnieć nie może?"

Jedno bez drugiego istnieć nie może! Życie chrześcijańskie bez Eucharystii istnieć nie może! Tymczasem dostrzega się stonkowo luzną więź między Eucharystią a życiem codziennym współczesnego chrześcijanina. Spotkać też można i takich chrześcijan, którzy nie dostrzegają żadnego związku Eucharystii z ich sposobem postępowania. Co gorzej są i tacy, którzy nie widzą sensu uczestniczenia w Eucharystii. Z tego też względu staje przed nami nagła potrzeba ukazywania czym jest Eucharystia, na czym polega pełne w niej uczestnictwo i jakie jest jej znaczenie dla chrześcijańskiego życia.

Jest rzeczą niemożliwą podać jakieś dokładne określenie, które w zwięzłych słowach oddawałoby istotę Eucharystii. Mówiąc o niej musimy być świadomi, że jest ona wielką tajemnicą naszej wiary!

Eucharystia pamiątką. Sprawowanie Eucharystii przez Kościół ściśle wiąże się z nakazem danym przez Jezusa: *To czyńcie na moją pamiątkę* (Łk. 22, 19). Słowo "pamiątka" zazwyczaj kojarzy nam się z tym, co minęło, co kiedyś było nam bliskie, lecz obecnie stało się odległe. Na kartach Pisma św. słowa "pamiątka", czy też "pamiętać, przypominać sobie" mają odwrotne znaczenie. Kiedy więc napotykamy wzmianki, że Pan Bóg pamięta o swoim przymierzu oznacza to, że Bóg działa zgodnie z zawartym przymierzem, że jest ono aktualne i realizowane.

Stąd też Eucharystia jest pamiątką w tym znaczeniu, że aktualizuje się, uobecnia w sposób rzeczywisty i prawdziwy zbawcze dzieło Chrystusa, zwłaszcza tajemnicę Jego męki i zmartwychwstania. Wyrazem wiary pierwszych wieków w obecność Chrystusa w zgromadzeniu eucharystycznym są słowa św. Jana Chryzostoma: "Ofiara Chrystusa jest ta sama bez względu na to kto ją składa, jest ta sama, którą Chrystus dał uczniom, a którą teraz składają kapłani. Ta w niczym nie jest mniejsza od tamtej, bo jej nie uświęcają ludzie, lecz ten sam, który i tamtą uświęcił. Bo jak słowa wypowiedziane przez Boga są tymi samymi, które teraz wymawia kapłan, tak też ofiara jest ściśle i zawsze ta sama."

Papież Jan Paweł II mówił: "Eucharystia, prawdziwe upamiętnienie paschalnej tajemnicy Chrystusa, zdolna jest zachować w nas żywą pamięć Jego miłości (...). Jest sakramentem nieustannej bliskości Zmartwychwstałego Pana w dziejach" (Eucharystia jako pamiątka 04.10.2000) **O. Paweł ofm**

HOW TO STAY SAFE IN THE WORLD TODAY.

ST. STANS HISTORICAL FACT

The Franciscan Sisters of Milwaukee, Wisconsin could not provide the number needed to teach in the expanding parish school. Father Theobald Kalamaja OFM asked for the services of the Sisters of the Holy Family of Nazareth. Thirteen sisters with Mother Stanislaus arrived on August 28, 1907 at the home they called the Sacred Hearts of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph Convent. The Sisters expected a convent but found only a hastily prepared house. Sister Postulants slept in the attic and the younger Professed Sisters made up couches in any available place for the night.
