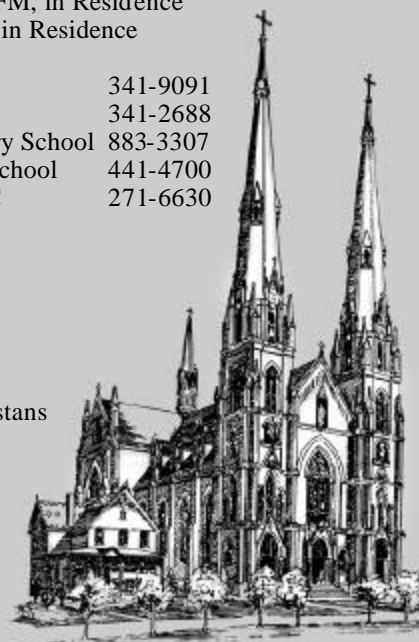

### The Triumph of the Cross

You see them at every turn...crosses. You see them covered in gold and silver, of richly carved red oak, of human flesh... attached to each of us...

*"If suffering is present in the history of humanity, one understands why his (God's) omnipotence was manifested in the omnipotence of humiliation on the Cross. The scandal of the Cross remains the key to the interpretation of the great mystery of suffering which is so much a part of the history of mankind.*

*Even contemporary critics of Christianity are in agreement on this point. Even they see that the crucified Christ is proof of God's solidarity with man in his suffering. God places Himself on the side of man. He does so in a radical way: "He emptied Himself, taking the form of a slave, coming in human likeness; and found human in appearance, He humbled Himself, becoming obedient to death, even death on a cross" (Phil 2:7-8). Everything is contained in this statement. All individual and collective suffering caused by the forces of nature and unleashed by man's free will—the wars, the gulags, and the holocausts of the Jews but also, for example, the holocaust of the black slaves from Africa." (JP II, Crossing the Threshold of Hope)*

The month of September began with memories of the beginning of WWII with the bombing of Westerplatte and Warsaw on September 1, 1939. Then, just the other day we mourned the death of one Cleveland policeman murdered in our city. We continue to hear of the carnage in Iraq as well as throughout the world. And this Monday we recall the attack on American soil in New York, Pennsylvania and Washington five years ago.

In our own parish we have experienced violence in the form of the murder of Fr. Willy. We know of the ongoing illnesses which plague our parishioners of all ages. We know of the depression of many, the loneliness of some, the near total despair of others. There is no doubt that we all suffer in one way or another.

Yet all of these sufferings would be absurd if not for the triumph of the Cross. The feast which we celebrate on September 14th reminds us of the unquestionable connection between God and all of us. The solidarity of God and humankind is unleashed in that symbol with which we were baptized and through which we attain eternal joy. In the words of St. Paul to the Galatians:

*"We should glory in the Cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, for He is our salvation our life and resurrection; through Him we are saved and made free!"*

## OPEN AND SHUT



“Don’t confuse me with the facts, I already have an opinion!” Believe it or not, a friend of mine from college actually said that during a heated argument held long ago. I don’t even faintly remember what we are arguing about, even though it seemed to matter a lot at the time. But I do remember that wonderful line of his!

The prophet Isaiah and the evangelist Mark both address the matter of being open. Isaiah delivers the word from the Lord, who proclaims to the people a promise that God will bring forth a new day — an amazing day when things will change for the better, a miraculous day when what we think is impossible will indeed be made manifest at the hand of our powerful and loving God. The only barrier to fully experiencing the joy of this day is our own fear. Frightened hearts are closed hearts, and it’s harder even for God to open a closed heart than to open blind eyes and deaf ears.

### Frightened hearts are closed hearts.

The Gospel of Mark, which presents Jesus as One with power over sickness, death, and the devil himself, today presents a healing story where the power of God is invoked through the word *ephphatha!* It is a command, direct, simple, and immediate. Be opened! And the man can speak and hear.

In the ritual for baptism of infants, there is a wonderful and brief prayer, called the “Ephphatha Prayer,” when the priest or deacon touches the ears and mouth of the newly baptized and says, “The Lord Jesus made the deaf hear and the dumb speak. May he soon touch your ears to receive his word, and your mouth to proclaim his faith, to the praise and glory of God the Father.” Sometimes the baby is already crying, as if the proclamation of faith were already beginning in the very wailing itself!

In baptism we are opened. But during the course of our lives we find so many moments that work to close us back up again. It is fear that closes us back in on ourselves, fear that clenches our fists and bites our lips, fear that raises our blood pressure and brings heart attacks, fear that locks our doors and turns off the phone. It is fear that clings to the shreds of what we can hold from our past, instead of opening our palms to receive a new though unseen abundance.

Our daily lives are filled with many fears, some of which are quite reasonable, some of which live more in our fantasy than in reality. But fear is fear, whatever its source and whatever its object. We fear terrorism, economic downturn, winter oil prices, medical bills, and the stranger walking down the street. We fear losing our hair, losing our homes, losing our mobility, losing our heritage.

But mostly we fear change. “The devil you know is better than the devil you don’t know,” we say. But it’s still a devil, isn’t it? As we prepare for some changes in our church lives in the diocese, let’s approach our future not in fear, with closed hearts, but in hope, with hearts and minds opened by the Lord at our baptism. Our Lord, who once said to us, “Ephphatha!” says it again and again — be open.

## PRZYCHODZI ABY NAS ZBAWIĆ



W dzisiejszym pierwszym czytaniu słyszymy słowa z księgi Proroka Izajasza: “Odwagi! Nie bójcie się!...odpłata Boża przychodzi; On sam przychodzi aby nas zbawić!” To optymistyczne słowa Proroka, jednak czy w naszym życiu faktycznie owocują one naszym pełnym otwarciem na Boże orędzie zbawienia?

Naszemu doświadczeniu wiary towarzyszą bardzo różne odczucia: pewności i niepewności, bliskości i dystansu, tęsknoty i lęku. Z jednej strony wołamy aby, by Bóg przyszedł, z drugiej boimy się, by nie przyszedł od razu. Bo my wiemy, że gdy Bóg rzeczywiście przychodzi, nie można już żyć po staremu. A my tak bardzo kochamy nasze “stare” życie, nasze przyzwyczajenia i słabości, ten bałagan, który w nas jest. Istota problemu sprowadza się do tego, że my “wierząc w Boga” nie zawsze “wierzymy Bogu”. A to przecież nie jest to samo. Myślę, że nawet praktykujący katolik powinien postawić sobie pytanie: czy rzeczywiście jestem człowiekiem wierzącym? Tylko pozornie odpowiedź na to pytanie wydaje się oczywista.

Wiara “w Boga” jest stosunkowo łatwa. O jego istnieniu są przekonani nawet poganie, do których nie dotarło jeszcze światło Ewangelii. Co więc stanowi istotę wiary w rozumieniu chrześcijańskim? Otoż trzeba to sobie to sobie powiedzieć zupełnie jasno: aby być chrześcijaninem, nie wystarczy wiara, że Bóg “jest”. Potrzebne jest jeszcze przekonanie, że ten Bóg objawił się nam w Jezusie Chrystusie i że ten Bóg “ma rację”. Ma rację nawet wtedy, gdy Jego racje nie pokrywają się z naszymi racjami, i dlatego dopiero wtedy mamy prawo uważać się za ludzi prawdziwie wierzących, gdy mamy więcej wątpliwości w stosunku do siebie samych niż w odniesieniu do Boga. A to — jak wiemy — nie jest takie proste. Dość łatwo potrafimy Bogu przyznać rację w sprawach ogólnych, trudniej (lub wcale), gdy chodzi o nas samych.

Wierzymy, że Chrystus jest wszechmocny, że jest w stanie każdego z ludzi przeprowadzić przez ciemną dolinę, przez różne meandry życia, byle tylko na nas nie eksperymentował i dał nam święty spokój. Wierzę w Chrystusa, w jego zbawcze możliwości, ale Chrystusowi często już nie wierzę. Wierzę, że Chrystus jest Zbawicielem świata, ludzkości, ale zapominam, że jest On także, a przynajmniej pragnie być również moim Zbawicielem. Będzie to jednak możliwe wówczas, gdy przyjmę Go do swojego serca jako mojego “osobistego” Zbawiciela, gdy pozwolę Mu wejść w moje życie i zrobić z nim generalny porządek, gdy mu po prostu uwierzę, że to co On mi proponuje jest po prostu dla mnie najlepsze. Czy mam na tyle odwagi by Mu na to pozwolić?

Chrześcijaństwo zawsze było i jest wymagające. Jeśli więc zdecydujesz się na ten krok, będziesz narażony na wiele trudności i nacisków, ale z drugiej strony będzie to wspaniałe partnerstwo: ty i Jezus. Warto mieć świadomość, że tym partnerem będzie sam Bóg. Będzie on więc nie tylko twoim partnerem, ale i Zbawcą. Wszystko to jednak zależy od Twojego wolnego wyboru, gdyż drzwi Twojego serca otwierają się tylko od wewnątrz.
